Facilities at Charney Manor

Programme useful information

Conference rooms

Charney Manor has two large conference rooms, both upstairs: the Solar in the Manor and the main meeting room in the Barn (accessible by lift). Also available in the Manor are a library and a sitting room.

Accommodation

Charney Manor can accommodate 35 guests in one double, eleven twin and eleven single rooms. All have ensuite bathrooms. Nine rooms are in the Manor house itself, ten are in the Vokins building and four are in the Barn. One single room and one twin room in the Barn, both on the ground floor, are adapted for wheelchair users.

The Gilletts, a cottage in the grounds, provides self-catering accommodation for groups of eight in five bedrooms, or additional accommodation for conferences (see page 11 for more detail).

Catering

Residential groups are fully catered for, with arrangements made for guests with special diets. Every bedroom has facilities for making hot drinks.

Library

We have a small well-stocked library mainly focused on Quakerism and contemporary spirituality. Guests are welcome to borrow books during their stay.

Internet access

Wi-fi internet access is available throughout.

Garden and walks

While staying with us you'll be able to enjoy three acres of beautiful, peaceful gardens, orchard and paddock largely maintained by volunteers. We are increasingly moving towards a more sustainable, organic management of our land, improving habitats and planting more trees. We are also restoring the Manor's kitchen garden to provide more produce for use in our kitchens.

There are good walks locally and many places of interest nearby, including the Uffington White Horse, Wayland's Smithy and the Ridgeway, and Kelmscott Manor: the country home of William Morris.



The Charney Manor programme

This programme seeks to nourish the spirit through silence, discussion, listening deeply, and exploring chosen themes with both mind and heart. All are open to everyone, including those of other denominations and faiths or with no religious affiliation.

We also offer attendees an option to have a few extra days of relaxation on a bedand-breakfast or fully catered basis.

20-22 February Challenging times: sustaining Quaker community Ben Pink Dandelion

In an increasingly secular world, how are Quaker communities to deal with the challenges facing us and flourish as vibrant spiritual communities? This course will chart our current context and offer a variety of ways to nurture the life of the Spirit in our Meetings.

Cost: £330 (deposit £170)

Ben Pink Dandelion has been part of the Woodbrooke team since the early 1990s and has written widely on the history, theology and sociology of British Quakerism. He gave the Swarthmore Lecture in 2014 and was one of the speakers at the Future of British Quakerism conference in 2024. He is a member of Pendle Hill Area Meeting, Lancashire.

25-29 May Experiencing Shakespeare John Lampen

In *The Tempest*, Shakespeare revisits many of his favourite themes, notably the (mis)use of power and the need for forgiveness; he also explores new forms of staging and language. In this course we will contrast it with Brecht's treatment of political power in *The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui*, discussing the issues raised by the two plays and seeing performances at the Royal Shakespeare Theatre, where Kenneth Branagh plays Prospero and Mark Gatiss Arturo Ui.

Cost: £520 (deposit £260)

John teaches the creative handling of conflict in Britain and overseas. His books include 'Mending Hurts' and 'Findings: poets and the crisis of faith'.

29-31 May Quakers and the afterlife Rhonda Riachi

For almost four centuries, Quakers have collected and shared evidence of what happens at death and before we arrive on earth. This course is for anyone genuinely curious about the afterlife. Through small group sharing and discussion in pairs, reflection and presentation, we'll explore personal testimonies and inspiring accounts.

Rhonda Riachi has followed developments in near-death experience and survival research for 24 years and is a member of the Quaker Fellowship for Afterlife Studies.

5-7 June Unfolding and enfolding: a creative retreat Philip and Zelie Gross

Aweekend to reflect on the constant change that underpins our life on Earth. Avoiding general statements and fixed positions, we will think with our hands, letting our instincts for creativity lead us, along with memory, imagination, association and other leaps of thought released by poetry.

The theme: unfolding and enfolding, two words so close in sound but complementary. In the height of summer, we'll think about the bedding down of Autumn and the openings of Spring.

Zélie Gross brings her experience of facilitating visual art, Philip Gross brings more than forty years of work with poetry, in a weekend fed by two decades of their work together with Woodbrooke on courses like the long-running Voices of the Earth.

We will explore how we might be led to live in these times of incipient collapse, how our Quakerism may be changing, and what a spirituality that is fully embodied in the Earth might look like in both witness and worship.

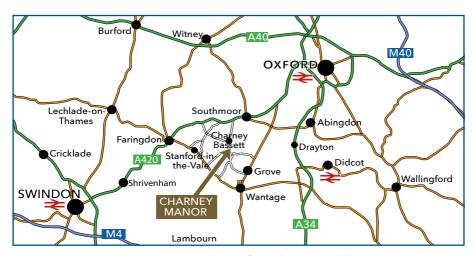
